


A modern example – Production (make/use) the "things" and Distribution (share, sell, trade)

### The Food Production Chain




#### From 1200 to 1450 – Regional Systems of Distribution


- Shift from community production & distribution to regional networks of trade.

### The Silk Road































# Key Ideas – Understanding Content
